



The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time


Haroun and the Sea of Storiesby SALMAN RUSHDIE

An imaginative adventure about a boy named Haroun whose father loses his imagination. To save the day, Haroun must travel to the mythical "Sea of Stories" and figure out why it has been poisoned. Beneath the playful surface of this tale is a razor sharp allegory about the stories we tell each other: about their origins, their powers, and the ways they can be saved or destroyed.










